“The harvest is plentiful but the laborers are few.”

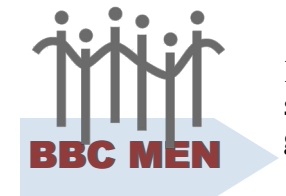

CHINA: THE NEXT GREAT CHRISTIAN NATION

Some of the greatest civilizations in history had their beginnings thousands of years ago. Egypt, Greece, and Rome usually come to mind, but those civilizations eventually came to an end, their hieroglyphs, cuneiform writings, and monuments left to the annals of history. Only one civilization has withstood the test of time, surviving and thriving for nearly 5,000 years: China. Since the beginning, China has been there, and it is still here, stronger than ever before. It is a civilization known for its flowering culture, profound philosophical insights, great monuments, and early achievements in science and invention, greatly admired by the likes of Marco Polo, Ibn Battuta, and Benjamin Franklin.

China has always been a religious and philosophical nation, known mostly for Buddhism, Daoism, and Confucianism. Daoism is as old as China itself, having begun merely as a philosophical tradition and school of thought until the introduction of false gods and idolatry where it no longer resembled its original message. Confucianism began in 500 BC as a set of moral philosophies concerning self-cultivation, family values, politics and government. Buddhism is a foreign religion introduced to China from India over 2,000 years ago. By early medieval times, Islam was introduced from the Middle East.

What most people don't know is that China's FIRST religion was a monotheistic one. Studies conducted about this religion have discovered its striking resemblance to another Eastern faith: Judaism. Before the other religions, China worshiped and believed in one God whom they called "Shang Di" which means Lord-on-High or Most High God. Christian scholars both Chinese and Western agree that Shang Di bears the same power, character, and nature as Yahweh, the God of the Bible. Numerous other clues in ancient Chinese culture have revealed that the ancient Chinese did indeed believe in the same God of the Hebrew people. Some of China's greatest philosophers, Confucius, Mencius, Modi, Lao Tzu, and Sun Tzu have expressed their belief and adoration of Him. Today, Shang Di, whom the Chinese also call "Heaven", is but a memory of the ancient past, an expression for "Higher Power" often associated with Daoist beliefs.

For centuries, Buddhism/ Daoism have dominated mainstream religion, Confucianism dominated state philosophy, and in some provinces, Islam has a foothold. Like Islam, Christianity was another Middle Eastern faith that had reached China before, but had since made an unnoticeable impact on the nation. It was not until after China's Imperial Age had violently come to an end in 1911, that the country had become very ripe for the Gospel. Many Christians migrated to spread the good news of Jesus Christ. Dr. Sun Yat Sen, the founder of the Nationalist Party and China's first president, was a born-again Christian. Their second president, political and military leader Chiang Kai-Shek was also a Christian! It seemed that China of the early 20th century was fast becoming Christian. However, in 1949, dark times arrived in China, and the Communist Party seized control of the country, leaving the defeated Nationalists to flee to Taiwan.

For decades during the 20th century, the Communist Party of China, under the leadership of Mao Zedong, has made attempts to completely extinguish religion from their nation in order to establish their atheist "Communist utopia". More people have perished under Mao's Cultural Revolution and Great Leap Forward than under Hitler's regime and Stalin's Soviet Russia. Fortunately, the CCP (Chinese Communist Party) failed to reach its goal. God had plans for the mainland.

Decades after the Mao era, China has opened up and has been prospering tremendously over the past thirty years. The Chinese people are experiencing far greater personal freedoms and economic opportunities than ever before. Every city glistens with gorgeous skyscrapers, expensive cars, and a booming hi-tech and pop culture. Despite this progress, underneath all the prosperity, many old wounds have yet to heal. The government continues to impose strict regulations on religion, especially upon Christianity where many community churches are continually harassed, bulldozed for "zoning violations", and has its buildings' crosses forcefully taken down from the steeples. Under the Chinese Communist government, the State reigns supreme over all other institutions and because they could not eliminate religion, they are trying to control it. This also means that the atheist Communist Party, via state-run churches, is in charge of ordaining their own pastors and priests – clergymen who have pledged their loyalty to the CCP above their faith in Jesus Christ. Because of this, many, many Christians in China have moved to underground churches where they can pray, worship, and study the Word of God without the damaging interference of an atheist government.

Today, China is the fastest growing Christian nation in the world with an estimated count of over 100 million believers, and is predicted to be the largest Christian nation in less than two decades. In fact, there are more Christians in China today than there are in the United States. In the West, Atheism, New Age Spirituality, and Islam are quickly on the rise but the Lord continues to build His church and increase the harvest in the ancient civilization of China. As persecution persists, we must remember to pray and send our love and support to our brothers and sisters who are so deeply passionate about their newfound walk and faith in Jesus. They continue to endure the hardships of being a Christian in a country dominated by an atheist government.

I've heard it said before that the greatest stimulator of the growth of Christianity is persecution, while the greatest killer of the Church is materialism and excess. After seeing many examples over the years across the world, I would have to say that this observation is fairly accurate. Perhaps the persecution and strict regulations in China are a blessing in disguise and has since caused Christianity to grow faster and faster, quickly transforming the world's greatest population of 1.3 billion to follow Jesus. The Chinese people are rediscovering their FIRST faith, having a restored relationship with Shang Di through the Lord Jesus Christ. The Lord continues to work in China and the Truth that is Jesus Christ will reign supreme over any man-made institution. "Blessed is the nation whose God is the Lord." (Psalm 33:12)

Sharing Colin's Blessing

Some of you may already be aware of the below story of our son Colin's recent surgery, but for those who have not heard it, I share it in the hopes that it might provide some encouragement to some of your own challenges.

The Lewis Family is beyond grateful with how the Lord has, yet again, proven Himself more merciful and loving to us than we deserve. He's so very faithful to His Word. On this past Mother's Day, as my wife Patricia and I wheeled Colin from the Pediatric ICU to his regular hospital room, we were truly grateful to our church family and others for the many prayers you sent up for him, and for us, as well. It goes without saying that we are even more grateful that our merciful Lord answered those prayers.

We checked Colin into the hospital on the previous Wednesday evening for his Thursday morning scoliosis procedure that would involve the fusing of nearly all of the disks in his back. On Wednesday night, I wheeled Colin to the van in one of his two wheelchairs. As I placed him inside, Patricia and I agreed that his second wheelchair might be more suitable, and I said that I'd instead load that one. When I re-entered the house with wheelchair number one, however, I got caught up in the carrying of Patricia's suitcase, with other details concerning the following morning, with the plans to ensure our other three children were squared away for the next couple of days, etc. I prayed once more for Colin and said my good-byes as he and Patricia departed for Walter Reed. Patricia called me later after she arrived at the hospital, and to my horror, informed me that I'd forgotten to load the wheelchair. She was unable to find one so late at night at the place where she had to enter the hospital from the parking garage, and thus had nothing to use to get Colin from the van, through the massive hospital, and into his room. With no other options being apparent, Patricia began to carry our 75-lb 16-year-old son, frequently stopping to lay him down and rest. Thankfully, a couple departing the hospital soon saw her and the husband sprinted off to get a chair from the main entrance area. When he returned with the chair, he was accompanied by a hospital employee who decided to come along after hearing that the chair was for a boy scheduled for surgery the following day. When the hospital employee saw Colin, she asked: "Does he have cerebral palsy?" Patricia acknowledged that he did, and the employee then asked about the procedure he was there to undergo. When Patricia explained about the scoliosis surgery, the woman excitedly shared that she has a 14-year-old brother who also has cerebral palsy, and who also underwent the same surgical procedure that our Colin would have the following morning. She shared with Patricia how well the procedure had worked for her brother. She then accompanied Patricia to the area where they would spend the night and loved on Colin so much. He was absolutely comfortable, and Patricia felt so much better hearing the woman's comforting and encouraging words. The hospital employee then promised to look in on Colin if he was still there the next time she had to work. We never saw her again while Colin was in the hospital, but I hope to one day be able to personally thank her for her kindness.

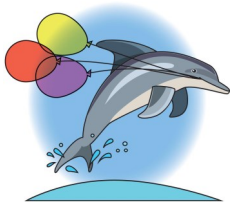
When Patricia called me that night and told me what occurred, I immediately recognized that this encounter was not "by chance," and was not a coincidence. Earlier, I felt just awful that I'd forgotten to load the wheelchair into the van, and couldn't fathom how I'd managed to forget it. It just seemed to make no sense. I'd never before forgotten to load Colin's chair in advance of countless other procedures and appointments, shopping trips, church, family outings, etc. But upon reflection, it really makes all the sense in the

world. It seems that, if Colin had simply been wheeled into the hospital in his own wheelchair with no issues or fanfare, the encounter with the kindly employee would not have occurred. Just as they always do, things happened exactly as they were supposed to. Initially, to Patricia and I, the matter seemed to be a bad situation that had devolved into a worse one. The mental image I had of my wife having to carry Colin down those long hallways in search of a wheelchair hurt my heart, but God was firmly in control and, after first relieving Patricia of a physical burden, He then mercifully relieved our entire family of an emotional one. I'm reminded that in all things, God works for the good of those who love him, who have been called according to his purpose. This describes our Colin to a "T," and I believe that our merciful Lord was working through people to provide Colin (and his parents) a measure of comfort that everything was going to be just fine. That's certainly the way we all felt the night prior to his surgery - and is the way that we still feel today. The few lingering concerns that I had about the procedure or its aftermath just faded away once I was able to observe that the Lord "showed up."

The following morning (Thursday), Colin had his surgery. I'll spare you the details of the procedure, except to let you know that everything went off without a hitch. It took about 12 hours: 2 hours to prep, 9 hours to operate, and another hour or so to close Colin up. There was much blood loss (twice his body's volume); he was dealing with much pain for a few days. He also spiked a few fevers, but all of this was expected, and the important thing is that he did not have to deal any infection, rejection, etc. On Mother's Day Sunday, we happily moved Colin from the Pediatric Intensive Care Unit and into his own room. As we did so, members of the ICU team shared comments about what they described as Colin's "mutant-like" healing factor because he's doing so incredibly well. On Thursday, May 12, just seven days after his horrific surgery, Colin was discharged from the hospital and came home. What a celebration we had! Although still a bit groggy from medication, he was smiling from ear to ear when he re-entered the home he loves so much, able once again to take part in the antics of the Lewis family circus. Some of you were there on the first Sunday Colin was able to come to church since his surgery. There he was: smiling and sitting taller and straighter than we've ever seen him sit before. And, not wishing to waste any of the time that God has given him, he was again singing praises to the Lord as loudly as he was able during the praise and worship portion of the service. Fresh from surgery, and already putting most of us to shame in the praise department.

To God be the glory for the things He has done!

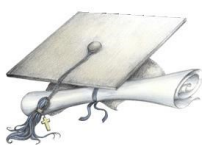

The Marriage Covenant

We shall delve into what constitutes a Biblical marriage covenant with God. Part 1 of the series shall lay the ground work for future articles on “Marriage Covenant.”

We have covenant with Jesus Christ as LORD and Savior of our life. Through the shedding of His blood for us, we in essence have a marriage covenant with Him. Christ is the Bridegroom, the head of the Church. We as BAB (Born Again Believers), are the Bride to be found without spot or wrinkle. All parts of the body are relevant whether toe, knee, ear, etc. Yet, fitly joined together are to function as “one” for the glory of God. Same holds true in the marriage covenant between man and woman. They then are not “two” individuals but become “one,” standing in the presence of God.

Our society has statistically proven an increase in receiving psychiatric care. Is there a common thread with the increased demand? Let us go back to the home life of these individuals which are comprised of father, mother, and children. Though many families exist with a single parent present, what toll has this taken on the lives of far too many to count not only nationally but worldwide? We note tensions and disharmony contribute to the strain and placing at risk for demise any marriage. Some contemporary sociologists are passively claiming this as the inevitable. Surely these pronouncements cannot be written off as “advanced” state of social process.

Let us proceed to receive some Biblical insight what is involved in a marriage covenant. Ephesians 5:21-32 starts with explaining the marriage covenant as a “mystery.” These verses provide insight into the responsibilities contained within the bonds of matrimony. Verse 21 begins: “Submitting yourselves one to another in the fear of God.” If there is not reverence for God, how can one revere the other within the confines of God’s mandates? The great mystery is concerning Christ and the church. The references swing back and forth between man and wife and Christ and the church—a sort of comparative analogy, if you will.

Malachi 2:13, 14 Israel’s failure to God is not religion. They are spending plenty of time at the altar weeping and praying. Israel’s failure is found in the end of verse 14-“though she is...your wife by covenant.” The Israelites were determining when they would initiate and when they would terminate a marriage on their “own” terms. Through this they lost their sanctity, strength, harmony, and stability. Today’s view on covenant marriage could be considered parallel to Malachi’s day.

Jesus had a conversation, a teaching on marriage with the Pharisees in Matthew 19:3-9. Verse 6 emphasizes the man and woman becomes one flesh. Remember, when in attendance for a marriage ceremony you will hear, “what God has joined together, let no man separate.” The Phari-sees even prodded Jesus on the bill of divorcement going back to the time of Moses. Jesus emphasized except for acts of immorality, there should be no divorce. Today, there is an expanded definition for divorce based

on physical abuse, child molestation, etc.

In the O.T., marriage is based on covenant relationship. Judaism was under-mining God’s plan. Judaism viewed marriage as “horizontal”—man and woman. With God’s personal relationship with man and woman, His proactive involvement with creation, man and woman became as “one.” They are to have a “vertical” relationship with God, their Creator and the “horizontal-”both are relevant.

Ecclesiastes 4:9-12 is allegorical in its presentation of the “three stranded cord.” These verses shall show us the difference between the Judaism view of marriage, i.e., “horizontal.” God’s personal, integral relationship within the marriage covenant is both “horizontal” and “vertical” which shall be presented. Verses 9-11 explain the Judaism “horizontal,” human plane between man and woman, “two together.” Verse 12 provides not only the “horizontal” but adds to it the “vertical” with the inclusion of God. “The cord of three strands” illustrates marriage at the time of its conception in the garden. A bond was formed between God, man, and woman. Adding God to the marriage covenant equation is very significant in all of its implications. This pattern for the marriage covenant established in the garden holds true today for believers through their faith in Christ Jesus.

The truths related to a marriage covenant begin with reverential fear of God. To understand the God-given principles within a marriage covenant, man and woman must be...even to the point of...at times making strenuous efforts in the presence of Almighty God. This goes back to Proverbs 2:4 when the couple is desirous of discernment and understand-ing. This search requires time and study of the Word. This time needs to turn into a labor of love for a blessed outcome, covered in much prayer, and patience with each other and...even with God. God does the miracu-lous but sometimes He wants us to grow a bit more. The pruning process taking place with both husband and wife can be very challenging to say the least. (Isaiah 48:10)

To understand relationship with God, one must understand covenant. We have the New Covenant through the shedding of the blood of Christ Jesus. Jesus obeyed Father, Jesus was the sacrificial lamb, and mankind, the recipients of redemption and promise of resurrection-eternal life. Christ was the second Adam; therefore, no further sacrifices were needed to redeem mankind. (John 14:6) In the O.T., Genesis 15:7-18 and Jeremiah 34:18-20, making covenant with God had the same basic principles applied. It required the sacrificing of an animal. Death, shedding of blood had to occur first. The covenant draws us to this somber revelation: I will no longer live for myself but I will live for you.
